







What is life like in the Ruhr region? Answers can be found in the exhibition "How We Live - Where We Live" at the Ruhr Museum on the UNESCO Zollverein World Heritage Site. The special exhibition shows about 200 documentary photographs by Brigitte Kraemer and a recent interview film. Her pictures going back more than 40 years tell stories of people from the region – stories of leisure and good times, but also of difficult life situations. All the photographs bear the hallmarks of Kraemer's unmistakable style, which is intimate, personal and unpretentious, testifying to her very special empathy with the people she photographs.



Born in Hamm in 1954 and resident in Herne, Kraemer has been working as a freelance photographer for such well-known magazines as *Stern*, *Brigitte* and *Der Spiegel* since graduating from the University of Essen (formerly Folkwang School of Applied Arts). She often chooses her own themes and pursues her projects over many years. One focus of her photography is everyday life in the Ruhr region. Since the early 1980s, she has been photographing people in a wide variety of situations: on campsites and in allotment gardens, by the canal, barbecuing, shopping, in ice cream parlours, at chip shops, on coffee trips, at funfairs and at kiosks. With humour and an eye for the bizarre, she paints a colourful picture of the population.



On the other hand, Kraemer also goes to places that are unknown to or difficult to access for most people. She takes photographs at Peace Village International in Oberhausen, in women's shelters and in women's prisons. Another theme is migration. To this day, she sensitively documents the lives of migrant workers, their families and refugees. Here she proves herself to be one of Germany's great social photographers, impressively capturing in images over decades the joys of life, but also the challenges that people face.



By staging this exhibition, the Ruhr Museum honours not only a major photographer, but also an extraordinary body of work. Kraemer has entrusted her extensive archive to the Ruhr Museum. Her provisional bequest of almost 400,000 images was purchased in 2022 with support from the Alfried Krupp von Bohlen und Halbach Foundation. The collection is one of the largest in the Ruhr Museum's photo archive. Following previous exhibitions on press photographer Marga Kingler and industrial photographer Ruth Hallensleben, this exhibition is the third part of the series on great women photographers of the Ruhr region.
