




1931–1973 Ruhr Museum at Zollverein in Essen

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
For the first time, the Ruhr Museum at the Zollverein UNESCO World Heritage Site is presenting 120 images from the estate of the notable contract photographer Ruth Hallensleben, thereby tracing an impressive panorama of her diverse work. Ruth Hallensleben (1898–1977) began working as a freelance photographer in the early 1930s. She forged a career in Nazi Germany, and after just a short time, she was able to set up her own studio called Lichtbildwerkstatt Ruth Hallensleben, which also employed assistants and apprentices. Except for the immediate post-war period, she continued to prosper as contract photographer in the 1950s and 1960s. Initially residing in Cologne, and later based in Wiehl and Wuppertal, Hallensleben was known for her precisely staged images and







idealising depictions. As a female photographer whose work was commissioned by the sector for heavy industry, she was perceived primarily as a successful industrial photographer, and her work was exhibited as such. Now the Ruhr Museum is presenting images from almost all genres of her varied work for the first time. The images on display are from the fields of landscape photography and architectural, industrial, portrait, travel and advertising photography. They were taken in the Eifel region, the Ruhr area, East Prussia, Belgium and Italy. The exhibition focuses on her work for her most important clients, such as commissions for the magazine Das Werk, produced by the industrial conglomerate Vereinigte Stahlwerke AG, as well as for the publisher Hoppenstedt Verlag, the axle





manufacturer Bergische Achsenfabrik Fr. Kotz & Söhne in Wiehl, and the mining company Gelsenkirchener Bergwerks-AG (GBAG). Her images reflect more than 40 years of German economic history under two different political systems. The reactions that her photographs elicited in the context of company archives, collections, museums and the art trade are a testament to the tremendous recognition that her work received. With around 38,000 negatives and approximately 1,500 prints, the Ruhr Museum holds the majority of her photographic estate. However, the exhibition is also supplemented by previously little-known photographs from other image archives.
